Spelling Words Diphthongs oi / oy

Generalization: the pattern of oi and oy reliably represent a single sound. The oy pattern comes at the end of a word or syllable (open syllable), while the oi pattern comes in the middle.

Spelling Words

Initial Syllables - a, de, be

<u>Generalization</u>: The initial unaccented syllables of words may be spelled in various ways, but three common patterns are a, de, and be. When a is an initial syllable, it becomes a schwa which makes the short u sound.
