

There are millions of hungry people worldwide who do not have enough money to buy food. This situation is a huge problem that must be solved. While on Earth, Jesus often found ways to feed the hungry. Today, there are people who happily work or volunteer to get food to the hungry.

A food pantry is the best way to get food to people who need it. A food pantry is similar to your food cabinets in your kitchen. Food pantries are places where people can go to get free food. 

Spelling Words

Suffixes - y, ly, ily

Generalization: A suffix is a word part added to the end of a base word that creates a new word used as a different part of speech. The suffix -y usually creates adjectives, and the suffixes -ly and -ily usually create adverbs.

Challenge Word: necessarily

Spelling Words

Adding ING to VCe and VVC words

Generalization: When adding *ing* to words that end with silent e (VCe), drop the *e* before adding *ing*. If a word ends with two vowels and a consonant (VVC), just add *ing*.

Base Word (VCe) Drop e - ing

blame blaming

ride riding

drive driving

Base Word (VVC) Add - ing

rain raining

clean cleaning

Challenge Word: explaining

<u>Spelling Words</u> Word Endings – dge / ge

Generalization: Words in English do not end with the letter *j.* instead the final sound is spelled with *ge* or *dge* and the *e* softens the *g.* Use *dge* after a short vowel and *ge* after a long vowel. When the *j* sound comes after *l, r,* or *n*, it is always spelled with *ge.*

Challenge Word: knowledge
