


Parent Comments (questions/concerns):



All sides are the same length; there are four right angles




Rectangle

Opposite sides are parallel and the same length; there are four right angles




Parallelogram

Two pairs of opposite parallel sides



Rhombus

Two pairs of parallel sides; all sides are the same length




Trapezoid


Only one pair of parallel sides

Spelling Words

Word Endings: -ce, -ve, -se, -ze

Generalization: Sometimes the *e* at the end of a word is not part of the vowel pattern. It makes the soft *c* sound in words like *dance*. *E* always follows words ending in *v* and usually follows words ending in *z*. Words ending in *-se* can have the /z/ or the /s/ sound.
