Paper Bag Book Report

Due Tuesday, November 3rd

Use the provided white paper bag to complete your report.

1. Book Report Cover:

Draw and color a cover for your book on the front of the paper bag. You can recreate the cover or choose your favorite scene. Make sure to include:

- ☐ An illustration
- ☐ The book title and author
- ☐ Your name

2. Objects / Pictures:

Find items to put inside your bag to represent different elements of your book. If you do not have an item for a specific part, you make draw or print a picture and put that inside your bag instead. Find items to represent the following things:

- ☐ Favorite Part: Find an item that represents your favorite part of your book.
- ☐ Setting: Find an item that represents the *main* setting in your book. For example, you could use a toy tree to represent the forest or a pencil to represent a school.
- ☐ Main Character: This item should tell us something about your main character. If your main character is an artist, you could include a paintbrush, if it's an animal, you could include a small stuffed animal, etc.
- ☐ Problem/Conflict/Goal: In every story, the characters face a problem they need to solve or have a goal they are working toward. Find an item to represent this.
- ☐ Solution / Resolution: Include an item that shows how your characters solved the problem or reached their goal.

3. Item Descriptions:

Use the attached description paper to describe each item or picture and how it relates to your story. Make sure to use complete sentences and check your work for correct capitalization, punctuation, and grammar.

4. Summary:

On the BACK of your paper bag, write a summary of your story. If you would like, you may write or type this on a separate sheet of paper and glue it to the bag.

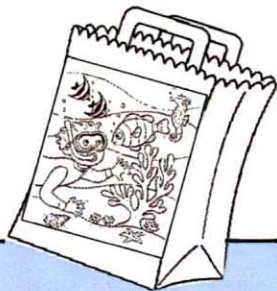
* Note: A summary is a short paragraph (about 5 - 8 sentences) that tells what your story is about. Summaries focus on important details that depict the overall story.

5. Presentation:

Students will be presenting their bag reports to the class. During their presentations, students will pull each item out of their bags and describe how it connects to the book they read. Please take some time to practice your presentation before you turn in your report.
